Now I only play two, but I've traded that easy schedule for a special event every Sunday leading up to Christmas. And what if this story actually plays out every day and we don't even know it? If God came to earth unexpectedly as a lowly child, maybe Christ is unexpectedly the beggar on the corner, or the lonely person in the back corner pew, or the migrant, or the widow. Maybe the real story of Christmas is that Christ can be anywhere, even now.

In the thick of the season, I try to remember that the story we celebrate for Christmas is everywhere all the time: Sunday after Sunday, day after day. It is a story to celebrate and a chance to live into our greatest traditions and relationships, but it should also shake us a bit. The reality of the Incarnation is both aweinspiring and formidable, calling us to a sense of purpose that is more Oscar Romero than Hallmark movie. And it's that idea that gives me the energy deep in December: saccharine gives way to mission; sentimentality gives way to resolve.

Christmas is always tomorrow, but maybe not because we fear the avalanche of work; maybe it's because Jesus could be standing next to you at any moment.

From Parker Ramsay: Next September, I am set to record my transcription of Bach's Goldberg Variations for the harp. I am most excited for this project, not only because of the repertoire, but because I will be making my debut harp recording in the chapel at King's College, Cambridge. It was at King's that I truly fell in love with Bach and began transcribing his keyboard works for the harp. As the King's College, Cambridge, record label has graciously agreed to pick up the CD, I feel I have the chance to give back to my alma mater and showcase the immense educational opportunity I was afforded as organ scholar.

In order for the recording to be made, I will need to raise $\$ 16,000$ to cover the costs of transportation, engineering, recording, and the mastering process. It would mean so very much to me if you would be able to contribute. All donors will receive a complimentary copy of the recording, and US/UK-based donors who donate $\$ 2000$ or more will be offered a private recital in their home or in any space of their choosing.
