Notes from Don

Epiphany...

Earlier this month, many of you celebrated Epiphany in your churches. But before Epiphany there was Advent, which I have often felt gets lost. The parties, buying gifts, baking cookies, and other secular trappings take over Advent as we rush toward Christmas. Along that line, by the time Epiphany is to be celebrated we've already packed up the tree and sung our last carol. Meant to be celebrated on January 6—or as some do, on the first Sunday of January—it is often relegated to the December Christmas pageants that compresses prophecy, birth, shepherds, angels, and the three

kings all into one convenient hour. Such was my childhood.

I'm not sure when I had an epiphany about Epiphany, but it certainly wasn't when I was in fifth grade in Missouri. That was the year I was chosen to be one of the kings in our church's Christmas pageant. Though the adults wanted to pound into our psyches the honor and importance of being chosen as the kings, I'm afraid it went in one ear and out the other. I and my two fellow kings were excited not only about being the climax of the "show," but were pumped up about the costumes. After all, we were going to be the best dressed for the play and get to bring really good gifts.

Of course, in Poplar Bluff this all took place on a Sunday evening in mid-December. And there was nary a mention of the words Advent or Epiphany. (Did I mention that it was a Christmas pageant?) Little did I or most likely anyone observing that august pageant realized the importance of the kings, or what they really represented.

Jonathan Rudy, a native of Batavia, Illinois, regularly appears as a recitalist and teacher across the United States, including appearances at the AGO National Convention in Houston and the 2017 ALCM National Conference, as well as with the Elgin Symphony Orchestra and Fox Valley Symphony Orchestra. Dr. Rudy was awarded first and audience prizes in the AGO's 2014 National Young Artists Competition in Organ Performance. He has also received awards and recognition in the National Organ Playing Competition in Fort Wayne, Indiana, and the AGO's 2011 Regional Competition for Young Organists.

Dr. Rudy received his doctorate in organ and sacred music at Indiana University, studying with Janette Fishell and Bruce Neswick. His prior degrees are from Indiana and Valparaiso Universities (studying with Lorraine Brugh and Karel Paukert at the latter), and he studied in high school with Karl Bruhn and Melinda J. Rudy, his mother. He

currently serves as cantor/director of music at Grace Lutheran Church in Clarksville, where he leads the congregation and musical ensembles. He lives in Clarksville with his beautiful wife, Katie, and their two children.

Elizabeth Gunnells Smith is co-owner of Lois Fyfe Music, a store specializing in sheet music for choirs and organists. Her primary organ teachers were Warren Hutton and Peter Hurford. She has been active in many Nashville music organizations, including the Nashville Symphony Chorus, St. George's Church, and Covenant Presbyterian Church.





Dawn Seidenschwarz has been a member of the Nashville AGO Chapter since 1992. She is organist and choir director at Our Savior Lutheran Church, choir organist for the Cathedral of the Incarnation, and accompanist for the Saint Cecilia Academy choirs. Dawn has a BM degree from Middle Tennessee State University, where she studied with Dr. Polly Brecht. She also holds the AGO's Service Playing and Colleague certificates. Dawn has served the Nashville chapter in the past as a member of the executive board, the nominating committee, and as secretary.

Jonathan Setzer is co-owner and managing partner of Lois Fyfe Music and an active organ substitute in the Nashville area. He has been a member of the Nashville AGO Chapter since 1999, has held the positions of dean and Pipelines editor, and has served on the executive, nominating, and program committees. Jonathan is currently the chapter treasurer.

John Johns, professor of guitar, emeritus, at the Blair School of Music, has performed many solo and chamber music programs nationally, and given solo recitals in France, Italy, Greece, and Malta. He retired from the Blair School in 2017.





Woosug Kang enjoys a dynamic career as a concert organist and church musician. Since 2016, he has served as the director of music ministries at St. George's Episcopal Church. He has initiated a new annual organ scholar training program and will be training the AGO organ scholar in 2024–25, following training the AAM/ Gerre Hancock music intern in the 2023–24 season. He led Royal School of Church Music (RSCM) choristers on a weeklong residency at the U.K.'s Ely Cathedral in 2019, and he recently led the adult choir and choristers of St. George's in a weeklong residency at Canterbury Cathedral.

As a recitalist, Woosug has performed throughout the United States, the United Kingdom, New Zealand, and Australia. He was a featured soloist for the American premiere of New Zealand composer John Wells's Organ Concerto with the Connecticut Virtuosi Chamber Orchestra, a performance that was broadcast on Pipedreams. He received his DM degree from the Indiana University Jacobs School of Music, where he studied with Larry Smith. The recipient of the Charles Ives

Award and the H.F. Bozyan Scholarship for Excellence in Organ Performance at Yale University, he earned his MM degree at Yale's Institute of Sacred Music, studying with Thomas Murray and William Porter. He was also the founder of the choir for the Episcopal Church at Yale on the university's campus.



Janice Kemp has taught music to students from nursery school through the college level in both public and private schools over the course of her professional career. She began her teaching career in elementary school in Arlington, Texas. After moving to Nashville in the mid-1980s she taught general music in the Junior School and AP Music History in the Upper School at Montgomery Bell Academy (MBA). Following another move, this time to Philadelphia, she taught for 17 years at Germantown Academy (GA) in Fort Washington, Pennsylvania, the oldest independent nonsectarian school in the United States (founded in 1759). During her tenure at GA she taught intermediate music and directed the Lower School Choir, while also serving as head of the performing arts department (Pre-K–12), with oversight of music, theater, and media. While in Pennsylvania, Janice served on evaluation teams for numerous independent schools renewing their state accreditation. Upon returning to Texas, she taught in the music department at the University of Texas, Arlington. In addition to teaching, Janice



served as the director of children's choirs at churches in Arlington and Nashville, and in Abington, Pennsylvania. She has served as choral clinician for numerous regional workshops and festivals. Coming full circle back to Nashville, Janice is happily retired and enjoys being active at Westminster Presbyterian Church, singing in Vox Grata, and spending time with her family. Janice holds a BME degree from the University of North Texas and an MME degree and Kodály Certification from Belmont University.

So, there we were, waiting in the wings for our cue, "We Three Kings of Orient Are." As the packed house began lustily singing the carol, we started down the aisle toward the chancel. I'm sure my mother, ever suspicious of my behavior, probably had one eye on me and one toward heaven with a prayer that I wouldn't do anything untoward. It was a night of miracles. The three of us arrived at the chancel-turned-stable without a hitch. We bowed before the baby and presented our gifts—at which point I think I heard a sigh of relief from my mother.

This moment of three fifth-graders showing remarkably good behavior for this occasion would have been a solemn ending to a rather catchall pageant. However, it was not quite the ending. For as we bowed our heads and the last words and music of the hymn faded, through a side door entered none other than Santa Claus. All solemnity ended and the pageant was lost in the distant past as several hundred children dashed through the sanctuary to grab the oranges, apples, and candy canes that Santa tossed throughout the room. What started as a retelling of the Advent, Christmas, and Epiphany story ended up in the bedlam of the "Christmas" season.

My hope is that each of you were able to experience a true Advent, Christmas, and Epiphany season. That the bedlam of the cultural Christmas didn't distract you from experiencing the longing, birth, and celebration of that child.

During the pandemic years of 2020 to 2021, program leaders and members of the Nashville chapter began to create virtual organ crawl videos. These videos can be viewed on the chapter website and YouTube channel.

In fall 2020, chapter member Elizabeth Smith created a video visit to the

Fisk Opus 134 at Covenant Presbyterian Church.

In May 2021, the program committee made available a video with visits to homes with pipe organs. Todd Milnar of the Milnar Organ Company was host for visits to homes of chapter members Rocky Craft, Michael Belote, and James Jordan.

The first church organ video tour was recorded in Clarksville in October 2021. Churches visited were Grace Lutheran Church and Madison Street United Methodist Church. Host organists were Rocky Craft, Jonathan Rudy, and Jared Wilson. Organist Peter Rogahn played each instrument for the recording.




