Notre Dame Organist Olivier Latry Inaugurates New/Old Organ at St. Andrew Lutheran Church, Franklin

MASTERCLASS Saturday, January 30 10 a.m.

ST. ANDREW LUTHERAN CHURCH is located at 908 Murfreesboro Road (corner of Mack Hatcher Parkway and Route 96), approximately one mile west of I-65 at exit 65 in Franklin, Tennessee. St. Andrew shares a common entrance with Legacy Crossing and is directly across from the fire station. Enter through the bell tower.

Aeolian-Skinner Organ, Opus 1511

The next-to-last organ built by Aeolian-Skinner was installed in the Episcopal Cathedral of Christ the King in Kalamazoo, Michigan, in 1970. The specification was by the cathedral organist, Alexander Boggs Ryan. Tonal finishing was by Donald Gillett; Allen Kinsey designed the case, facade and lay-out. This organ is the only free-standing, encased instrument built by Aeolian-Skinner.

The organ was purchased in the summer of 2007 by Saint Andrew Church. Working a 66-hour week in the ninetydegree, un-air-conditioned Cathedral, a team of nine men from the Milnar Organ Company dismantled, removed, and transported the organ to their shop in Eagleville, Tennessee. The Milnar firm systematically repaired, cleaned, updated, renovated, and installed the organ in the new nave of St. Andrew Church. The basic voicing of the organ has not been changed; however, some new stops have been added to fill out deficiencies in the specification. The order of the manuals has been changed to the traditional American style. In addition, the electrical components of the organ have been updated and brought "up to code" with a Peterson control system. Nashville Chapter member Tim Murphy, as an apprentice with Aeolian-Skinner, was a part of the original installation team in Kalamazoo; now, as a member of the Milnar firm, he is installing the organ again.





Olivier Latry

Titular organist of the Cathedral of Notre-Dame in Paris, Olivier Latry is one of the world's most distinguished organists. Since his first tour of the United States in 1986, he has played for numerous national and regional AGO conventions, as well as inaugural recitals on new instruments in concert halls and churches throughout North America. Beyond the U.S. and Canada, Latry has performed in more than forty countries on five continents.

Latry has produced many recordings, including the complete organ works of Olivier Messiaen and Maurice Duruflé. Not wishing to specialize in a particular repertoire, he strives to be an ambassador of seventeenth to twenty-first century French music. In addition, his improvisational skills put him in the company of the great French organists, such as Tournemire and Cochereau. In 2009, Latry was named International Performer of the Year by the New York City Chapter of the AGO.

It is a privilege to have an artist of this stature to return to Nashville to inaugurate the Aeolian-Skinner organ at St. Andrew Church.

It's About Time

Have you ever noticed how obsessed we are with time? Think about the phrases we use: on time, ahead of time, behind time, passing time, at times, behind the times, out of time, at one time, at the same time, time and time again, working against time, lose no time, time-honored, killing time – too time-consuming to name more.

We all know how important time is to a musician. We think in terms of duple or triple, and simple or compound time. We use words relating to time such as beat, period, rhythm, tempo, etc. And, how crucial it is to have enough practice time!

A new year has begun, and, with it, a new decade. With time, we measure life and its events. We recall experiences as they relate to family, weather, or national events: in the year of Katrina, or around 9/11. Still, is there not more to life than marking the years and getting the music right?

Thus far, we are talking about a span of time or a range of time, and sequential or linear time. It is life by the metronome and deadlines. This is clock time: past, present, and future. The New Testament calls this measurable duration "kronos" ($\kappa\rho\delta\nu\sigma\sigma$) time from which we get the words chronic, chronicle, and chronology.

More important is another New Testament word for time, "kairos" (καιρόσ). "Kairos" time is the right, opportune, acceptable, or appropriate time; a fixed or special occasion. It speaks of a convenient or due season. It is in the present, a quality of time, a critical juncture, a decisive moment, a divine appointment or intervention. "Use the present time (opportunity) to the full" (Eph. 5:16). And, "…as opportunity offers, let us work for the good for all" (Gal. 6:10). Sometimes, "kairos" is used with the idea to redeem, to buy back, or to rescue the time from loss and improve opportunity. "Kairos" is God's time, when God breaks into history. "The time has come; the Kingdom of God is upon you." (Mk. 1:15). It calls for decisive action that brings deliverance or salvation.

In the New Year, opportunities may call for spiritual growth or new directions. Such opportunities require decisions or commitments, life-changing for self or others. Critical junctures at decisive moments present opportunities which linger only for a short or appropriate season. Everyone has to give attention to the pressures of "kronos" where "time like an ever-rolling stream" bears all away. But where life and lasting values are concerned, might it not be wise also to grasp, to take advantage of "kairos" time?
