#### FROM THE DEAN

Having Jack Burnam for our November meeting was very helpful, and many of you have spoken about his good, practical repertoire list. In his suggestions for rehearsal, there were several ideas he mentioned that I used to do, but had forgotten. Singing the text on a monotone, but in rhythm is such good help as well as singing on "ah," "doo," "ma," etc., so that the choir is not trying to learn everything at the same time. We thank Elizabeth Smith, too, for her excellent accompanying, and Westminster Church caterers for the delicious dinner. As you know, the December meeting is at Christ the King Catholic Church, 3001 Belmont Boulevard. The Executive Board will meet at 5:15 PM and the AGO dinner will follow at 6:30 PM. Hazel Somerville will bring two of her choirs from Blair School of Music to provide the program at 7:30 PM. The Nashville Boy Choir and the Advanced Girls Concert Choir will perform. It is so nice to have choral music in such a fine acoustical environment.

Since I have just completed conducting Organ Masterclasses in Madison, WI, Philadelphia, PA, and Princeton, NJ, I thought I would speak briefly about these experiences. My former student, Samuel Hutchison, is the Curator of the new Klais Organ in Overture Hall in Madison, WI, and Principal Organist with the Symphony. He gave the invitation for Parker Ramsay to play an Organ and Harp Concert on Saturday morning, October 14, and for me to do a Masterclass in the afternoon from 1:00 to 4:00 PM. Parker had about 300 very enthusiastic people at his concert, and there were about 100 who stayed through the class. Three young high school students played beginning repertoire. The first boy, quite young, played a Rheinberger Trio incredibly slowly, one note at a time. In the left hand there was a rest in each measure followed by 5 descending notes with long sustained notes in the right hand. Once he relaxed on the downbeat, we got him to let the other notes "fall" and he could do more tempo. So we made a little musical progress. All three of the young students had their knees spread as wide apart as they could and played on the outside of their feet. I told the first two if they could not get their knees more together I might have to get a rope to tie them together. So when the third boy did the same, Sam brought me a rope and we tied them loosely together. I think no one took me seriously. The fourth boy to play was a graduate student who was quite advanced and played the Bach Fantasy and Fugue in G Minor. At every rest in the Fantasy there seemed to be such a long pause, we could have gone out to lunch. So after conducting through the rests, we managed to accomplish a more cohesive musical expression. There were three other students and their teacher who had come to observe. So we found some music they had studied in the Wayne Leupold First Organ Book, 2<sup>nd</sup> edition. Sam and I did the registration for them and they were thrilled to have a chance to play the organ. They obviously had excellent teaching from Anita Schulz, who has 14 organ students at a Luther Preparatory School in the area. Sam is going to work out a date for all of them to come have a full day on the organ.

I taught next at Curtis Institute of Music. All students had excellent facility and played from memory. I taught some Franck and Bach and worked with conducting and singing in the Franck. The students were eager to keep learning about Baroque Performance Practices, so I shared with them my newest, most

wonderful book by Jon Laukvik, Historical Performance Practice in Organ Playing. I met Jon Laukvik in Bergen, Norway, when we were both playing for an International Music Festival, and he was writing this book then. Our recitals were all on the same instrument. (My practice time was from 5:00-7:00 a.m., and my walk from the hotel to the church covered an area open to the North Sea. It was incredibly cold and windy in May, almost like winter. After my breakfast back at the hotel, I would crawl under as many covers as I could find and take a long nap!!) Back to the subject at hand. After the two hour morning class, Alan Morrison, Professor at Curtis, drove me to Princeton, NJ, where he teaches one day a week and attends the Tuesday afternoon Masterclass. Ken Cowan, the full-time teacher at Westminster Choir College, took me to lunch while Alan taught some students. Then I conducted the Masterclass from 3:00 to about 5:30 PM. Again there were excellent students, most playing from memory, who played Franck, Sowerby, and Bach. Afterward we spent a little time talking about professionalism in your job, discipline, and subjects they were interested in discussing.


The next morning I had breakfast with Diane Belcher, and then we walked (one block away) to St. Mark's Episcopal Church, where Diane and Matt Glandorf are Co-Organists/Choirmasters. At noon Matt improvised an organ concert, first a Suite in French Classic style, then a Sicilienne in the style of Fauré, and, unfortunately, I had to leave for the airport before he improvised in the style of Dupré. I was glad to see the church and the arrangement, since I am conducting there for the Morning Mass and the afternoon Evensong in May.

It was very rewarding to meet and experience so many especially talented and brilliant organ students.
