I can't help but think that many of us are discussing our struggles; some intensely, others eventually ending in a chuckle, and maybe laughter. Our chapter has been lauded on many occasions for this very fact. We support each other as our struggles surface, as well as cheer one another for our successes.

On Sunday, March 8, 3:00 p.m., at St. George's Episcopal Church, we cheer one of our own, Dr. Wilma Jensen. At the young age of 80, she is playing a recital, and what a success! This event is tucked in with her ongoing schedule of teaching, workshops, seminars, and other recitals. Please join me in support, and cheer for Wilma by attending the concert.



**T. Evans Baird** graduated from Georgetown College, with a Bachelor of Music Education degree, where he studied organ with Lucile Bradley, and was president of the student organ guild. For 30 years, he taught choral and instrumental music at Westwood Junior High School in Manchester, where, at various times, two-thirds of the student body were enrolled in elective music classes. He has been president of The Middle Tennessee Vocal Association, active in The Middle Tennessee School Band and Orchestra Association, and The American Choral Directors Association. In addition, he belongs to The Organ Historical Society. While director of music at First United Methodist Church in Manchester, the church installed the first pipe organ in Coffee County, an organ of thirty-two ranks. Evans was director of the Sewanee Children's Choir Festival, and director of the Tullahoma Civic Choir. In the mid-seventies, he served on the executive committee of the Chattanooga AGO Chapter. From 2002 to 2005, he served on the Nashville AGO executive committee, and was instrumental in establishing the chapter website. Currently, he is Choir Director at St. Barnabas Episcopal Church in Tullahoma. For the past 16 years, he has directed a community choir of adults and children from the Manchester area. Evans is fortunate to have a four-rank 1936 Kimball pipe organ, which he disassembled in California, and rebuilt for his home. He is a member of the board of directors of the Coffee County Historical Society, and serves on the Historic Zoning Commission for the City of Manchester.

**Gerry Senechal** has been a church musician since age eight, when he became organist of his father's Episcopal church. He then sang, while he was only a boy, in the Men and Boys Choir of All Saints Episcopal Church in Worcester, Massachusetts, touring England in 1993. Gerry attended the University of the South, graduating in 2002. While there, he gave several recitals, and, in his senior year, was elected President of the University Choir, with which he has toured England four times. Gregg has served churches in Georgia, Indiana, and Texas, and has taught on the adjunct faculty of Dallas Baptist University and Mercer University's McAfee School of Theology. In 1996 and 1997, he was a national finalist in the Music Teachers National Association collegiate organ competition. As a member of the Atlanta Chapter of the American Guild of Organists, Gregg has won first place at both the undergraduate and graduate levels of the chapter's annual competition. In 2007, he served the Atlanta AGO as chair of the recitals committee for the regional convention, which was held in Atlanta. Currently, Gregg is the Organist at Brentwood United Methodist Church in Brentwood, Tennessee.

Jere Adams is a native of Atlanta, now residing in Murfreesboro, Tennessee, since 1983. He is a graduate of Georgia State University, Atlanta, with an undergraduate degree from Georgia State University in English (BA); Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, Ft. Worth, with degrees in Music — organ concentration (BCM, MCM), and Religious Education (MRE). For 10 years, he served as a minister of music for churches in Alabama, and Tennessee, and retired from LifeWay Christian Resources, Church Music Department, where he served as a music literary editor from 1987-2004. He previously served as music associate for the Tennessee Baptist Convention (1983-1987).

Jere now serves as minister of music for Riverdale Baptist Church, Murfreesboro (2005-present). In addition to membership in the American Guild of Organists, he is also a member of the Tennessee Baptist Men's Chorale, and the Southern Baptist Church Music Conference (where he has served on the Executive Council for the past several years as the Editorial Coordinator).

**Joel Bolen** is a native of Morris, Illinois, a small town about 65 miles southwest of Chicago. He began piano study at the age of 10 with the church organist/choir director, and studied organ privately in high school, and as a secondary at Millikin University in Decatur, Illinois, where he was a piano principal, and received a B.M. in piano performance, completing the requirements for both a classical performance degree and a commercial performance degree. He received his M.M. in Piano Performance from Belmont University, where he studied applied piano with Dr. Robert Marler, and collaborative piano with Dr. Melissa Rose.

Joel has been an active church musician since 5<sup>th</sup> grade, when he played recorder descants and solos with the parish choir during Liturgies at Immaculate Conception Church in Morris, later playing piano with the "contemporary" ensemble. After two years, Tom transferred to the University of Kentucky, where he studied organ with Arnold Blackburn.

In his senior year, Tom switched from Bachelor of Music to Bachelor of Arts, and pursued work in English and history for teaching credentials. Subsequently, he earned a Master of Arts degree at George Peabody College, taught English in the Franklin high school, and became the organist of The Presbyterian Church in Bowling Green, Kentucky, where he presided over the installation of the last Aeolian-Skinner contract. Bankruptcy of that firm allowed Robert Sipe of Dallas to assume the contract and install the 29 rank tracker organ. That association as organist has lasted 45 years.

Tom has served in several officer positions in the Nashville AGO; has been involved in local restoration and renovation activities; and serves currently on the board of Riverview (historic home in Bowling Green), and as president of the board of Shaker Museum at South Union in Kentucky. Nashville AGO has been an inspiration for Tom's continuing professional development.

#### From **Sandy Tipping**:

I have been the band leader on the General Jackson showboat since May, and am currently participating in the renegotiation performance contract between the AFM and Gaylord Opryland Productions. We performed nine shows a week between Thanksgiving and Christmas, and are getting ready to head back into prime tourist season, with our new show — a remounting of Opryland Theme Park's Country Music USA. I am also the music director and writer/arranger for the Theodore Roosevelt Medora Foundation's Medora Musical, a two and a half-hour outdoor musical revue that is performed in the badlands of North Dakota. This will be my second year as MD, and there's over two hours of music to write and orchestrate. We use a live six-piece country band on stage, and I produce supplementary tracks with orchestra and "Chicago"-style horns in Nashville. Last year, we brought approximately one and a half hours of tracks from Nashville, using over 30 of Nashville's finest musicians. This show is in casting production now, and will enter rehearsal at the beginning of May, opening in June, and running through September. I also stay busy with my own production company, Advantage Music Production. We are a full-service

production company, handling EPs and albums for artists in a variety of genres, as well as arranging for various ensembles, engraving, and lifting. Our most recent production project, a band from Mississippi, is in rotation on Christian AC radio. Check-out the website at <www.advantagemusic production.com>. Lots of content!

Of course, I'm also still the **organist at Tulip** Street United Methodist, where I'm one of a handful of people who think that maintaining and protecting the 1891 George Jardine tracker is still a worthwhile affair. We use the organ every Sunday, and it is a wonderful instrument to play. The congregation doesn't realize how truly fortunate they are to have such a well-made instrument - one of lesser quality would not have held up to the rigors of time as well as this one has. Recently, Brad Rule removed and restored the 8' Trumpet, and has created a proposal to rebuild the still-original manual chests, which are approaching the end of their useful life (120+ years isn't too shabby). This will be a huge investment, and will launch the organ into its second century of service. If anyone is interested in finding out more about this instrument, please contact me.

# LOAD-IN DAY OF THE NEW FISK ORGAN AT COVENANT PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, NASHVILLE

**Valerie Rains**, organist at Covenant Presbyterian Church, Nashville, sent the following report of their congregation unloading the new Fisk organ on February 8<sup>th</sup>. "It was an exciting day! The congregation unloaded for about seven hours. We had two 53' semi-trailer trucks full to the top with organ parts, and also one smaller truck half full. We had 200 people, and a perfect warm day for the exciting work. There were seven employees from Fisk directing us, and organ parts were placed in different parts of the sanctuary and sorted appropriately. The sanctuary is extremely full with parts. I got to carry in the keyboard, with the help of a few men - fun! Erecting of the organ began the next day, and the blowers were wired the next day. The organ should look complete in approximately a month, and then the voicing will begin, and will take approximately six months. Our consultant, **Janette Fishell,** was also present for the morning, and got to be a part of the excitement.
