

NOTES FROM DON



Many of our chapter members are busy with the quickly approaching Holy Week. For church musicians it is an extremely busy time. There is Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and then Easter Sunday—plus Easter Vigil for some. When I was actively involved as a church musician, Holy Week was the high point of the Christian year. But even with the business of it, I felt the need to experience Holy Week, not just rush through it, hoping to make it to the Monday after Easter. For me, without Holy Week, there is no real Easter. When one experiences it all together, you

walk where Christ walked and at some level have a better understanding of his passion and resurrection.

During Holy Week we begin by experiencing the joy and excitement of Palm Sunday as Christ enters the city of Jerusalem as the King of Glory. Each Palm Sunday takes me back to my childhood, where I was given a palm branch and ask to wave and shout "Hosanna." (Oddly, I could feel my mother's eyes piercing me to remind me that my palm branch was not a sword.) I remember it was a time of excitement as we "welcomed" Jesus. Even today, Palm Sunday helps us to imagine Jesus entering the city with a cheering throng.

Then there is Maundy Thursday, where Jesus held the Last Supper with his disciples. We find that one of them will betray him. How terrible it must have been for him. I imagine some of us have felt betrayed at times. Does this deepen our understanding of his sorrow? In reflecting on that betrayal, I wonder if I have betrayed him at times.

The next day, Good Friday, is a dark day for Christians. Christ's crucifixion should weigh heavily upon us. If we do not feel the depth of the crucifixion, how can we truly understand the high of Easter? This service recreates the agony and suffering of our Jesus. It helps us to understand that he truly died for each of us.

From the low point of Good Friday, we are drawn into the drama and celebration of the resurrection on Easter. What a glorious day in the life of the church, and hopefully in our lives as individuals. As church musicians, we lead choirs singing "Alleluia" and let the organ peal forth in voluntaries, hymns, and anthems to proclaim a risen Christ. Through him, death is vanquished.

I hope that those of you who are leading Holy Week services will not do so quickly, but rather center yourselves so that you might also find a deeper meaning in this week. So that you can go forth into the world with an Alleluia in your heart and on your tongue.

Vincent Dubois, titular organist at the Cathedral of Notre-Dame Cathedral in Paris and newly appointed professor of organ interpretation and improvisation at the Hochschule für Musik in Saarbrücken, Germany, is one of the finest concert organists in the world today.

A graduate of the Conservatoire National Supérieur de Musique in Paris, Dubois took the world's stage in 2002 by winning two major organ competitions: the Calgary International Organ Competition and the International Competition of Toulouse, France.

In January 2016, Dubois was appointed the newest of three titular organists of Notre-Dame Cathedral in Paris, where he continues to serve alongside Olivier Latry and Philippe Lefebvre. Prior to that appointment, he served as titular organist at Soissons Cathedral (2001–14) and Saint-Brieuc Cathedral (1996–2001).

Dubois has performed in major concert venues throughout Europe, North America, Asia, and the Pacific, and has been featured at numerous international music festivals. He has also appeared as guest soloist with many orchestras and ensembles, including the

Philadelphia Orchestra, the Los Angeles Philharmonic, the Dallas Symphony, the Hong-Kong Philharmonic, the Orchestre Philharmonique of Radio France, and the Orchestre National de France.

Dubois is featured in solo recital on several commercial recordings, including a CD of the organ music of Franz Liszt on the Vox Coelistis label, a CD recorded at Saint-Sulpice in Paris on the JAV label, and a CD recorded at Saint-Etienne-de -Caen featuring the complete Third Symphony of Louis Vierne and the Preludes and Fugues of Marcel Dupré on Radio France's Tempéraments label. His performances have also been broadcast over Radio France, the ORF Vienna, CBC Radio Canada, Australian Radio, and American Public Media's Pipedreams.

Prior to joining the faculty at the Hochschule für Musik in Saarbrücken, Dubois held the distinguished post of director general of the Strasbourg National and Superior Conservatory of Music in France from 2012 until 2022, and he taught organ at the Freiburg Musikhochschule in Germany from 2018 until 2022. He has additionally taught organ masterclasses at prestigious institutions in the United States, including the University of Michigan, where he served as continuing guest artist from 2014 to 2016.

MIKE BELOTE grew up in Exmore on the Eastern Shore of Virginia. He graduated from James Madison University with a bachelor's degree in music education and later studied organ at Winthrop University. After living in Manassas and, later, Roanoke, Virginia, he moved to Nashville in 1991 and worked at Vester Music from 1991 to 1995. After the business became Lois Fyfe Music, he worked there from 2005 to 2014.

Mike has served four United Methodist churches, as well as one congregation each in the Southern Baptist, Lutheran, Catholic, and Episcopal Churches. He is currently the organist at First Presbyterian Church in Springfield.

He bought a six-rank Delaware organ from Sweet Briar College in Virginia and combined it with an Allen, and now the three-manual hybrid—complete with all the pipes—is sitting in his Burton Hills home. Can we call it a DelaAllen?

He and his partner of 50 years, Jim Kessler, collect antiques, love watching talent shows, and have seven Cavalier King Charles Spaniels.



ROBBIE JONES is from the Mississippi Delta, where as a child she had a Tennessee Walking Horse as a hobby. Her father was pastor of Mt. Olive Baptist, where as a ten-year-old she began her love for organ playing on the church's two-manual Wurlitzer. Through high school she played at another church on a two-manual Hammond. She graduated from Mississippi College in Clinton with an English teaching degree and a minor in organ with an emphasis in accompanying.

She came with her husband (who worked for Firestone) from Tupelo to Nashville in 1980. She worked at the UMC General Board of Discipleship for 15 years, had some organ lessons with Peter Fyfe, and was organist at Glen Leven Presbyterian from 1980 to 1990. She has been organist at Belmont UMC since 1990, and during that time accompanied the Vanderbilt University Concert Choir for 21 years.

She and her husband have two grown daughters, and she loves gardening and knitting.

Both PPPs began with a short video demonstrating four organs: a ballpark instrument, a theater organ, a gospel organ, and a church pipe organ. The big hit of both mornings was constructing our organ kit. Students clamored around the organ parts to work together to bring it to life. They were fascinated to hear and play it upon completion.



He is a member of the American Guild of Organists, the Royal School of Church Music, the Fellowship of Worship Artists (UMC), and the American Choral Directors Association, and he serves on the national board of More Light Presbyterians.

We welcome **Jacob Callender** to our chapter. As a high school senior, he has been studying organ with Jonathan Rudy for over a year and piano over two years. Additionally, he has played the euphonium for seven years. Jacob attends West Creek High School in Clarksville, where he is number nine out of 365 students in his graduating class! 2024–25 Organ Scholar named in partnership with American Guild of Organists and St. George's Episcopal Church, Nashville, TN

St. George's Episcopal Church and the American Guild of Organists (AGO) are pleased to announce the appointment of **Kateri Andress** as the recipient of the 2024-25 Ronald G. Pogorzelski and Lester D. Yankee Organ Scholar Program.

Ms. Kateri Andress will begin her work as Organ Scholar in August 2024 for 10 months at St. George's Episcopal Church in Nashville. Ms. Andress is currently earning her Master of Music in Organ Performance and Literature at the Eastman School of Music in the studio of David Higgs. She is a graduate of Ave Maria University, where she earned a Bachelor of Arts in Music with a double concentration in



organ performance and sacred music. She currently serves as the Organist at the United Church of Canandaigua in Canandaigua, New York. Ms. Andress will be mentored by Director of Music Ministries, Dr. Woosug Kang, in the working details of leading a nationally recognized music ministry, including choral accompaniment, service playing, conducting, coaching adult and youth choristers, and related administrative skills.

Continuing the vision to mentor and nurture future leaders in the sacred music field, this will be the fourth Organ Scholar at St. George's, and the first partnership with the American Guild of Organists. The AGO represents approximately 12,000 member organists and choral conductors, and they have been actively growing their initiatives to foster and nurture young organists to develop skills in the sacred music field. The AGO's National Council recently approved an ongoing partnership with varying churches for this very purpose, naming the Ronald G. Pogorzelski and Lester D. Yankee Organ Scholar Program. St. George's is proud to partner with the AGO following a successful partnership with the Association of Anglican Musicians in 2023-24, mentoring Gerre Hancock Intern, Mr. Abraham Wallace.




