BIOGRAPHY SKETCHES OF NOMINEES FOR 2008-2009 OFFICERS

Lisa Barry has been a member of the Nashville AGO for many years, though off and on, mostly on, since her Belmont 'College' days. Currently she is organist and choir director at St. Patrick's Anglican Church in Smyrna, lives in Franklin, and also works part-time as a royalty and permissions administrator for the copyrights of the United Methodist publishing group, the Nazarene publishing group, and other publishers.

Ralph Black came to Tennessee from Indiana in 1963 as a sales/marketing rep for Capitol-EMI-Angel Records. Educated at Butler University in Indianapolis, with a major in piano and a minor in organ, he has served various churches in the Nashville area as organist/choirmaster, including St. Philip's Episcopal, Donelson; St. Joseph of Arimathea Episcopal, Hendersonville; St. Timothy Lutheran, Hendersonville; and Church of Our Saviour Episcopal, Gallatin. Following retirement from Capitol Records in 1990, he studied piano tuning and repair in Ohio and then established a tuning business serving Metropolitan Nashville, currently in its 18th year. Additionally, he was the pianist for The Establishment big band for many years, that included performing with the Nashville Symphony and the late Maestro Schermerhorn. Ralph currently leads a small jazz group that performs for private events throughout the mid-state area. A Guild member for over 28 years, he has served two previous terms on the board of the Nashville AGO chapter. He is now active as a sub.

Joyce Byrd recently celebrated 35 years as organist at Crievewood Baptist Church in Nashville. She serves as Associate Director of the Moench Center for Church Leadership at Belmont University, which is a professional development organization for ministerial staff in leadership skills. Joyce is accompanist for Belle Voci Choir, a semi-professional choir in residence at Belmont University. She serves as Treasurer and Webmaster for National Bivocational Ministers Association and has previously served as Executive Assistant to the President of the Baptist Sunday School Board (now LifeWay). Joyce graduated from Murray State University in Murray, Kentucky. She taught public school music and English in Kentucky and Florida, as well as private piano and organ. Her service in the AGO includes Program Committee, Endowment Committee, Treasurer, Auditor, Secretary of a Regional Convention, and Treasurer for 2012 National Convention. She is the mother of 4, grandmother of 13, and wife of Dr. Robert Byrd, professor in the School of Religion, Belmont University, and AGO Chapter Friend.

Steven Clark began his musical training in the children's choir at Brainerd Methodist Church (Chattanooga) in 1961 with Bill Gray. Although his first instrumental training was on the violin, when Steve heard/felt the 32' Untersatz on the new Moeller at Brainerd in 1965, that was all it took to convert him to the organ! Steve received his B.Mus. in organ performance from the University of Tennessee and later a M.Mus. in choral conducting. He served as music director at Church of the Ascension (Knoxville) for 15 years before moving to Florida, where he served two other Episcopal churches. In 1993, Steve became a licensed massage therapist, but continued part time in church music. He has been Organist-Choirmaster at First Presbyterian (Gallatin) since 2002 and has sung with the Nashville Symphony Chorus since 2006.

Rocky Craft graduated from M.T.S.U. in 1969; taught general music, keyboard, chorus, and directed musicals at the same school for 32 years, all the while playing organ for local churches. He retired from public school in 2002, becoming full-time music director and organist at Grace Lutheran Church in Clarksville, TN. Craft has been a member of Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia (charter member at M.T.S.U.), the Music Educators National Conference, the American Choral Directors Association, Middle Tennessee Vocal Association, The American Guild of English Handbells Ringers, the Choristers Guild, The Organ Historical Society, The Association of Lutheran Church Musicians, as well as a member of the Nashville chapter of AGO since 1965. Craft has served on many boards and program committees of many of these organizations, as well as serving as the Dean of the Nashville Chapter of AGO for 4 years. He also served on the planning committee/transportation chair for both regional conventions and our POE. Rocky says, "This is a strong chapter where the camaraderie is our strong point. We must continue building and growing in this unity to be able to present an outstanding National Convention in 2012."

A lifelong devotee of the organ and of church music, **Herman DePriest** has been a church organist in numerous Middle Tennessee churches - almost continually - since 1970. His teachers have included the late W. Jackson Hurt, Peter Cook, and Dr. Henry S. Fusner, AAGO. He re-joined the Nashville Chapter in 1985 and in 1990 earned the Colleague's Certificate from the American Guild of Organists. His prior AGO service includes member of the Executive Committee and current work as Secretary of the Website Information Committee for the Nashville 2012 National Convention. During the day, Herman is found working for the Samick Music Corporation at the North American headquarters in Gallatin, Tennessee. He has been the organist for Cross of Life Lutheran Church (LCMS) in Antioch for the past 10 years and continues as Middle Tennessee's only factory-certified Allen organ installer / service technician. He is honored to be a candidate for membership in the next Executive Committee three-year class and would consider it an even greater honor to be elected to this office.

James Jordan has been a member of the Nashville Chapter for 28 years. He is employed by LifeWay Christian Resources, where he has managed the Accounts Receivable Department for the past 22 years, serving the trade divisions of B & H Publishing and LifeWay Worship Music Group. He is also Director of Music for Westland United Methodist Church in Lebanon and serves as Cumberland University organist. He presently serves the publishing industry as chairman of the National Book Group, a group made up of over 45 major publishers in the U.S. He holds degrees from Cumberland University and additional work at Vanderbilt University. He presently serves the Chapter on the Finance Committee, and as Registrar for the 2012 National Convention. He has previously served the Nashville AGO as Treasurer for the local chapter, Nashville '95 Regional Convention Treasurer, and POE Treasurer.

Susan MacAfee (not to be confused with McAfee virus scan) has served as volunteer choir accompanist at Grace Lutheran Church in Clarksville, TN, for the past 9.5 years. She studied piano with Dr. Joseph Evans at Michigan State University. Other teachers have included Shirley Twietmeyer O'Connor, Steven Hesla, Donald Morelock, Dr. Forrest Robinson, and Dr. Nancy Zipay. Organ teachers have included Andrew Risinger, Rocky Craft, and Dr. Richard Shadinger. MacAfee recently completed her Masters degree in Corporate Communications and did an Internship with the Nashville Symphony for one semester. She is currently on the Adjunct Faculty at Austin Peay State University. Susan has been a member of the Nashville AGO since 2002 and a member of the Music Teachers National Association since 1983. She also serves as Director of Public Relations for the Concert Series at Grace. MacAfee resides in Coopertown with her husband and youngest son. Her daughter is a junior majoring in vocal performance at Valparaiso University, and her oldest son is a sophomore majoring in composition and is a member of the Col Legno String Quartet at Tennessee Tech University.

Valerie Rains has been organist at Covenant Presbyterian Church in Nashville since 1994. She is also a music educator and teaches elementary general music for the Murfreesboro City School System. She has been a music educator for 18 years and has devoted a good part of her life to educating the next generation of young people to love music. Teaching about the organ is part of this vision. Covenant Presbyterian Church is currently undergoing a building project for a new sanctuary and a new organ. Valerie and the organ committee have secured the Fisk Organ Company to build them a 3 manual instrument that is now under construction. This organ will be completed and installed early in 2009. As a teacher, Valerie has had many leadership roles in school and in a previous AGO organization. She has been a building representative for the Teacher's Education Association for 10 years and also served as secretary of this organization. She was president-elect of a very small AGO in Quincy, Illinois, in the early 90's before deciding to move to Murfreesboro in 1994. Valerie has sought to continually improve her organ skills and passed the Service Playing Exam two years ago. She will be taking the Colleague Exam on May 9th and is dedicated to continual growth in her own organ playing. Valerie would like to become more involved in the Nashville AGO, to help utilize the new instrument that will be installed at Covenant Presbyterian, and also desires to serve this organization to help promote the organ in our area.

Marsha Scheusner has been the full time Director of Music/Organist at First Presbyterian Church in Columbia, TN, since 1997, where she directs a graded choir program and concert series. Prior to her move to Tennessee, she taught high school choral music in Rapid City, SD. She has degrees from Northern State University (SD) and MM in church music from the University of TN. She has done post graduate study in choral conducting at the University of Northern Colorado with Dale Warland and the University of Minnesota with Philip Brunelle. She is a past dean of the Black Hills (SD) Chapter of AGO and past president of the Middle TN Chapter of Choristers Guild. Her proudest achievements are her two children, Heidi & Geoff, who both got married this past summer, and everyone survived to tell about it!

Janet Ramsey Schmidt, a native of Columbia, SC, holds a BA in Music Education from Newberry College, South Carolina (ELCA). She began playing organ professionally at the age of 13, serving Holy Trinity Lutheran Church in Columbia, SC, for 18 years as organist/choirmaster. In May 2006, she directed and played the festival service there in honor of the retirement of Pastor Carl Voges. Where did you grow up: Nashville, TN

Where did you study music and who were your organ teachers: MTSU – Undergraduate Music/Organ degree; Cumberland University – Master's degree. Studied organ with Greg Colson, Joe Marcus Ritchie, Margaret Wright, Peter Fyfe, and Andrew Risinger.

List the churches/institutions where you have played and/or conducted and/or taught, etc. and number of years: West Nashville Presbyterian – 3 years; First Southern Methodist – 3 years; Arlington UMC – 17 years; State St. UMC (Bowling Green) – 9 years; Grace Lutheran Church (Clarksville) – 10.5 years. Taught Music at Neely's Bend Middle School - 32 years

List some of your accomplishments: Some of my proudest accomplishments are to see several former students go on and major in music as well as becoming organists for churches. Former students include Michael Card and Randy Scruggs.

What are some of your most memorable experiences during your tenure: Accompanying a local high school tour to England and the Netherlands. Taking my church choir to sing at Bruton Parish Church in Williamsburg.

How did our chapter deal with difficult times (war, finances, changing trends in the churches, etc.): Finances – we have been careful and generally good stewards. Changing trends – we recognize them and have spent some educational time with MIDI, etc. And I think we are seeing that change is cyclical, swinging back towards "serious" music in some places.

List funny and/or memorable experiences from your career in music: One funny experience was playing a wedding at a guest church with a guest trumpeter. We reached the point on the schedule for the processional – we played for 20 minutes with no bridal party or minister. With the lips shot, I finally played the party down by myself. The most memorable experience is the honor Grace Lutheran bestowed this past fall by commissioning an anthem from K. Lee Scott for my 10th anniversary. An added honor was bringing Scott in to direct it without anyone spilling the beans in advance.

Name: Lois Fyfe

Where did you grow up: Urbana, Ohio

Where did you study music and who were your organ teachers: The Ohio State University (B.A. in Music; B.M. major in organ) – organ study with Wilbur Held. Organ Institute, Methuen, MA – Arthur Howes, E. Power Biggs, Arthur Poister, Ernest White, Carl Weinrich. Two lessons with André Marchal. Columbia University with Carl Weinrich – two years of lessons once a week.

What are some of your most memorable experiences during your tenure: During Peter's 35 years at Christ Church Episcopal, there were many highlights: Leo Sowerby's two visits and his conducting choir and brass; Peter's commissioning of numerous new works and their performances; his recognition for superb musical and liturgical achievements and Gerald Near's compositions written in honor of Peter. And during his nearly 40 years of teaching at the Blair School of Music, his fine students, many in prominent posts throughout the country, and their continuing contacts with Peter and me – these are very valuable associations in our lives.

List funny and/or memorable experiences from your career in music: When I went to New York City in 1949 to study organ with Carl Weinrich, I was hired as Assistant Reference Librarian at the Juilliard School of Music. The record librarian, Marion Low, was the wife of the music critic of the (German) daily newspaper (Staats-Qeitung). He (Fred Low) received two free tickets to almost all concert performances in New York. Marion chose not to go to many of the programs, so for the four years I worked at Juilliard, I went to nearly all concerts of the New York Philharmonic, Boston Symphony, and Philadelphia Orchestra, among

others; many recitals (including one by Vladimir Horowitz during which we sat on the stage); Metropolitan Opera, etc. All of the Juilliard recitals and concerts were free to us employees. (At one of those concerts, Samuel Barber sat only a short distance from me). During the ten years of living and work in New York (including, of course, the six years after Peter and I married), Church Music was at its peak, we think, with Virgil Fox and then Fred Swann at Riverside Church, Harold Friedell at St. Bartholomew's, Frederick Candlyn at St. Thomas, Alec Wyton at St. John the Divine (after Normon Coke-Jephcott retired), Ernest White at St. Mary the Virgin, George Meade at Trinity Church, Vernon deTar at Church of the Ascension and at Juilliard, Searle Wright at Columbia University and at the Chapel of St. Thomas Church, Clarence Dickinson at Union Theological Seminary and at Brick Presbyterian Church, Ray Brown and Peter Fyfe at The General Seminary of the Episcopal Church. Peter was also Organist-Choirmaster at St. Michael's Episcopal Church and at St. Paul's Chapel of Trinity Church just before we moved to Nashville. (St. Paul's Chapel now is known best as the haven after 9/11/2001 attack on the World Trade Center). The years 1949 to 1959 were the very best to enjoy and benefit from the musical giants of the world in one wonderful city.

Name: Peter Fyfe

Where did you grow up: Born August 23, 1923 and grew up in Covington, Tenn.

Where did you study music and who were your organ teachers: Early musical training was with beloved aunt, the late Ermine McNeely. At the American Conservatory of Music in Chicago, teachers were Edward Eigenshchk, Frank Van Dusen. At The School of Sacred Music, Union Theological Seminary, New, teachers were Hugh Porter and Vernon deTar. Further study was with Carl Weinrich at Columbia University. Received BM, MM, MSM degrees.

List the churches/institutions where you have played and/or conducted and/or taught, etc. and number of years: While I was in the Service in North Africa, I was interim organist at the American Church in Cairo, Egypt. In Chicago, I was Organist-Choirmaster at Church of the Holy Nativity and St. Martin's Episcopal Church. One summer there, I substituted for Leo Sowerby at St. James Church. In New York, I was Organist-Choirmaster at St. Michael's Episcopal Church and later at St. Paul's Chapel, Trinity Parish. I was occasional keyboardist for The Cantata Singers in New York. I was Sub-Organist at General Theological Seminary in New York, 1951-1959. I exchanged job with Wilbur Held in 1955 (he needed residency in New York at Union), Ohio State University, Columbus, Ohio. Organist-Choirmaster Christ Church Episcopal, Nashville – 1959-1994, Adjunct faculty at Blair School of Music – 1964-2004. State Chairman, AGO, 1975-1981. Director, Episcopal Church Music Conference, Province IV 1978-79, Sewanee and Monteagle, TN. Organ Teacher at Tennessee Tech for two years in early 1970's. Organ Teacher at Belmont University to fill-in for Helen Midkiff. Organ Teacher at MTSU to fill-in for Margaret Wright.

List some of your accomplishments: I played Bach's Prelude and Fugue, D Major, BWV 532, for American Conservatory of Music graduation celebration, Orchestra Hall, Chicago.

What have you found significant during your tenure in the Nashville chapter: Change in character and general attitude of its members 1959-2008. Significant growth in membership, due, in large part, through the work of Sharron Lyon.

How did our chapter deal with difficult times (war, finances, changing trends in the churches, etc.): Bravely.

List memorable experiences from your career in music: Christ Church Choir sang the first Nashville performance of Stravinsky "Mass" and Duruflé "Requiem". Performances with the First Presbyterian Choir (Henry Fusner) of Stravinsky "Symphony of Psalms", Holst "Hymn of Jesus, Vaughan Williams "Mass in G" for double choir. At Christ Church, Leo Sowerby conducted "Festival Musick", Eric Routley conducted combined choirs of Christ Church and Peabody College in introduction of "Ecumenical Praise", Gregory Woolf composed, mounted and conducted his "Mass with Electronic Tape", Barry McDonald conducted his "Jazz Mass with Hymns".

Name: William R. Gable

Where did you grow up: Gordon, Pennsylvania

Where did you study music and who were your organ teachers: In hometown studied with Margaret Wagner, who had an organ in her home. Received B.Mus. and M.Mus – Westminster Choir College with

teachers David Craighead, Walter Baker, Clair Coci.

List the churches/institutions where you have played and/or conducted and/or taught, etc. and number of years: St. Pauls' Lutheran – Philadelphia (1 yr.), St. Paul's Lutheran - Wilmington, NC (2.5 yrs.), Central Baptist – Hartford, CT (22 years), West End UMC – Nashville (4 yrs.), St. Henry Catholic (8 yrs.), Holy Trinity Lutheran (15 yrs) concurrently with early Mass at the Cathedral. Taught organ at Hiatt College, Hartford, CT (3 yrs.).

List some of your accomplishments: Having a Youth Choir capable of doing things like the 20th century folk mass, "Godspell" and "Joseph and the Technicolor Dream Coat". Redesign of the front of Central Baptist, Hartford, and enlarging the four manual Austin organ. Consultant for the new Schantz at St. Henry Catholic. Presenting a wide range of oratorios, especially with the wonderful soloists in Debussy's "The Prodigal Son".

What have you found significant during your tenure in the Nashville chapter: Continued growth and quality of programs each month. The willingness of members to pitch in and work together. We truly are a Middle Tenn. Chapter.

What are some of your most memorable experiences during your tenure: Meeting famous organists: Dupré, Langlais, Marie Claire Alain, Pierre Cochereau.

How did our chapter deal with difficult times (war, finances, changing trends in the churches, etc.): We have held to the high ideals of our founding fathers and not given in to praise bands and hymn slides, etc. At a low point in membership in middle and late 1950's, I remember meeting with Carlton Young at Scarritt, and he suggested we should let the chapter die for several years and then start afresh. Thank heavens through strong leadership, that did not happen.

List funny and/or memorable experiences from your career in music: In college having the opportunity of singing with Bruno Walter, Leopold Stokowski, Charles Munch, Eugene Ormandy and others. Had two grooms faint on me. When I started playing, \$10 was the normal wedding fee. \$20 was a bonanza. In Masonic work I was the Grand Organist of Tennessee for ten years. Led the summer music program one summer at Green Lake, WS for the American Baptist Convention.

Name: Douglas Jennings

Where did you grow up: Woodbury, TN

Where did you study music and who were your organ teachers: Piano Teacher – Melinda Burger Snyder, now living in Franklin. Organ – Marian Ross and Margaret Wright at MTSU, minor in music, 1978.

List the churches/institutions where you have played and/or conducted and/or taught, etc. and number of years: First Baptist, Woodbury, 31 years.

What have you found significant during your tenure in the Nashville chapter: I have enjoyed getting to know other AGO members and visit in their churches. The Nashville Chapter has come a long way in 34 years of my membership. The Program Committee does a great job for our diverse membership. I can remember many fine members, who are no longer with us.

What are some of your most memorable experiences during your tenure: The Regional Conventions, the Paul Manz Hymn Festival in 1983, and the Victorian service in 1995 were both highlights. Going to AGO meetings with Margaret Wright and the student Guild group from MTSU was always enjoyable. The growth of our chapter has led to great enthusiasm in our chapter.

How did our chapter deal with difficult times (war, finances, changing trends in the churches, etc.): The only financial thing I remember was money was short for the orchestra at the 1995 convention. We haven't had too many programs that would relate to blended worship.

List funny and/or memorable experiences from your career in music: Once when playing for a wedding, it was nearly time for the bride to enter. Someone came up to me and said the zipper on the bride's dress had broken, and her aunt, who was the home economics teacher at the high school, was sewing her in her dress. Everything happened right on time. The first time I played "My Eternal King" was memorable. I was privileged to play our pipe organ the first time it was used in a service as well as the digital addition to it 28 years later. Playing for the dedication of our renovated sanctuary was a highlight – one of those "high and holy days" that stay with you.

Where did you grow up: Middle Tennessee — born in Dover and attended schools in Maury, Rutherford, and Giles counties.

Where did you study music and who were your organ teachers: Martin Methodist College; MTSU (B.S. with senior recitals in both Organ and Voice); Peabody College (M.A.); Eastman School of Music, University of Rochester; University of Alabama (Ed. D. with a hymn-related dissertation); private study with Merle van Zandt Booth (a pupil of Nadia Boulanger). Attended many conferences, conventions, workshops, etc., in MTNA, MENC, NATS, PAM and a few in AGO (became a certified Church Musician in PAM in 1979). Organ teacher was Margaret Wright.

List the churches/institutions where you have played and/or conducted and/or taught, etc. and number of years: Full-time teaching – 10 years (1948-1959): Holcomb, MO Independent School District (1); Trousdale County Tenn. Elementary and High School (1); East Central Jr. College, MS (3); Wartburg College, IA (4); Peabody College and Demonstration School (1). Part-time teaching – 5.5 years (1959-60, 1968, 1981-84): Peabody College (2); MTSU (1/2); University of Alabama (3). Church work – spanning 59 years (1947-99, 2002-2008). Staff – 23 years: Woodland (2+2); Second Presbyterian and Trinity Presbyterian, Nashville; Covenant Presbyterian, Tuscaloosa, AL (16); St. Mark UMC, Northport, AL (3). Interim/Part time - 6 years: St. Bartholomew's and St. Ann's Episcopal, Nashville; Memorial Presbyterian, Montgomery, AL; Christ Episcopal and First Presbyterian, Tuscaloosa; St. Paul's Episcopal, Greensboro, AL. Substitute/ contract and other church work – 26 years: in various Methodist, Presbyterian, Episcopal, Christian, and Lutheran churches in TN, MO, MS, IA, and AL. Also sang in a few churches in MN, SD, and ND. For three years at ECIC in MS, my teaching included organ students; and I sponsored a Student Guild Group. For four years at Wartburg College in IA, my teaching included organ students and pre-theological students. **List some of your accomplishments**: If breadth of experience is anything to be proud of, then that might be my greatest achievement. I especially enjoyed preparing choirs and playing pipe organs for congregational singing, and I would like to think that is what I did best.

What have you found significant during your tenure in the Nashville chapter: Even when I had dual memberships and lived elsewhere, I felt in close communication with this chapter. It's phenomenal growth is amazing.

What are some of your most memorable experiences during your tenure: Locally, Lawrence Petran's organ recital (in the 40's); music of J.S. Bach (in 1950-1951); singing the complete "Messiah" at the Ryman and Bach's "B Minor Mass" with St. George's Chorale (in the 60's); Regional AGO (in 1995); Chapter meeting in February, 2008. Also the Mozart "Requiem" sung at the Ryman by the Robert Shaw Chorale on the night of the big, icy snow storm that closed everything including Vanderbilt University.

How did our chapter deal with difficult times (war, finances, changing trends in the churches, etc.): There may have been challenges and discussions, but I was not aware of or perhaps I just don't remember a real problem in the chapter itself. Big changes occurred quickly, as with Vatican II, new hymnals, etc. and worship styles continue to change. One AGO magazine cover pictures a chancel area turned sideways!

List funny and/or memorable experiences from your career in music: Once a bagpiper, playing outside but nearby, interrupted my pre-nuptial organ music for several minutes. Once during an anthem, a storm caused a power outage that brought darkness and silenced the organ. However, the choir continued to sing! Once I stopped practicing organ when several men in two fire trucks came in to change all the light bulbs. Because the sanctuary had very high ceilings and a slanted floor, the firemen used a dangerous-looking rope ladder.

Where did you study music and who were your organ teachers: 1964 Giles County Band TUBA (still playing a little); 1972-1975 Peggy Campbell – Tennessee Tech University – BS Electrical Engineering 1975; 1978-1994 Zoë L Harris – FUMC, Pulaski.

List the churches/institutions where you have played and/or conducted and/or taught, etc. and number of years: FUMC Pulaski – Associate Organist/ Choir & Hand bell Director – 33 years (Played last service 1997); Cedar Grove UMC (Marjorie's Home church) – sub 25 years.

List some of your accomplishments: Married Marjorie in 1979, and she knew that a pipe organ came with the deal! She is still with me even though her living room now has 2 pipe organs, 2 reed organs, plus 2 tubas, 2 euphoniums, 3 baritones, and a trombone. Both sons, Robert and John, obtained Rank of Eagle Scout. Built my first organ Married Marjorie 1979 and she knew that a pipe organ came with the deal! She is still with me even though her living room now has 2 pipe, 2 reed organs, plus 2 tubas, 2 euphoniums, 3 baritones, and a trombone. Both sons Robert and John obtained Rank of Eagle Scout. Built my first organ – 1975.

What have you found significant during your tenure in the Nashville chapter: Great bunch of people, always make a person feel "AT HOME" even if they only attend once in a year or so.

What are some of your most memorable experiences during your tenure: The slide shows Lowell Riley presented. The meeting when we had the home organ tour; I brought some pictures of my instrument. One of the members at the table made the comment "I always admire anyone who can do that". I feel the same way about the Guild members when I hear them play. The information sessions when there were 3 of 4 topics to choose helped to fill in some of the gaps with the changing trends.

How did our chapter deal with difficult times (war, finances, changing trends in the churches, etc.): Finances – we have been careful and generally good stewards. Changing trends – we recognize them and have spent some educational time with MIDI, etc. And I think we are seeing that change is cyclical, swinging back towards "serious" music in some places.

List funny and/or memorable experiences from your career in music: Funny:

Had an engineer friend call that he was having problems with the pedal board of his church organ. Seemed too tight on some notes and not all notes sounded. It was a simple problem; the hard part was getting the panty hose out of the switches. Organist must have gotten hot or something. Different: My interest in organ came from a different direction than most organists. As a freshman engineering student at TTU, we were required to write a research paper and for whatever reason I picked the pipe organ. After all the research, I thought it might be fun to learn to play one. I found a teacher (Peggy Campbell), who was willing to take on the task of turning this "screwball engineer" with no keyboard experience into an organist. All those years of playing tuba paid off; I never had a problem reading an organ score because that third line or 4th part is what I was used to reading. I have been in love with the instrument ever since. Memorable: I received a telephone call at work on Tuesday, March 29, 1994 from Brother Moore, our minister at FUMC, to tell me that Zoë had passed away that morning. It was a shock to hear the news, but this was also the Tuesday of Holy Week! My hand bell choir was playing a bell and organ prelude and a bell, organ, and choir call to worship. I was filling in as Choir Director at this time; therefore I had two anthems to contend with for Easter. Played Zoë's Funeral on Wednesday at 1PM, directed Choir rehearsal that night, and played service Thursday night and Easter Sunday Morning. Easter Sunday was also the first time the Processional Cross was used. The Cross was given in memory of my father who had passed away in January. I will never forget that Holy Week. By the Grace of God, we all made it through that week!

THE UNIVERSITY OF ALABAMA'S 2008 CHURCH MUSIC CONFERENCE


The University of Alabama's 2008 Church Music Conference. "The Messiaen Year: French Connections", was held at the Moody Music Building in Tuscaloosa on January 25 and 26 and featured an outstanding faculty that included Daniel Roth (St. Sulpice, Paris) and Faythe Freese (UA Professor of Organ). Dr. Freese commissioned a new organ work, To Call My True Love to My Dance, from Lebanese-born Naji Hakim for Friday night's opening Festival Concert. Hakim is organist at Trinité Church in Paris where Messiaen served as organist for 60 years. The work is based on a Danish carol tune and is an extensive set of variations. The folk tune is charming and Hakim's writing is smart, clever and winsome—it's a real audience pleaser. Dr. Freese met the virtuosic demands of the score with great artistry and played the concert hall's 85-rank Holtkamp organ with great command! This concert also featured the University Singers (John Ratledge, conductor) in breathtaking performances of Messiaen's O sacrum convivium and Vierne's Messe Solennelle.

Classes and workshops began on Saturday morning and included a masterclass and two improvisation sessions with Roth, hymn playing with Freese, and classes in children's choir techniques, Psalmody, instrumental sacred repertoire, choral conducting, worship planning, handbells, and a choral reading session led by Nashville Chapter member, **John Semingson**. The afternoon ended with a fine recital of French organ music played by Daniel Roth. **Lois Fyfe Music** was present with a terrific selection of choral and organ music exhibited by **Elizabeth and Marcel Smith**.

The Conference is held the last weekend of January each year, and it is well worth the 4-hour drive to attend.
